Dance around the World 2006

Colorful costumes and energetic dances from around the world wowed attendees of the Multiracial Family Resource Center's first annual fundraiser on May 5, 2006. *Dance around the World* was created to educate the community about unique needs of multiethnic children.



A Reason to Dance

Dance around the World was planned as a celebration of MRFRC's dedication to helping develop positive identity amongst multiethnic youngsters and providing a supportive and educational environment for multiracial families.

The evening began with a brief synopsis of a University of Washington study which found multiracial adolescents were significantly more likely than white, black or Asian-American youth to smoke cigarettes, use marijuana, abuse alcohol or engage in violent behavior

In response to the study's results, UW faculty and co-author of the study Richard Catalano said, "Discrimination felt by these children no doubt contributed to involvement in problem behaviors. Formation of identity is more difficult for multiracial children who have to figure out where they fit in and belong."

Tracy Harachi, an additional co-author and UW associate pointed out that despite the unsettling findings the percentage of multiethnic adolescents engaging these behaviors is far outweighed by the number of those who have not. "But there are growing numbers of multiracial children, and we need to know more about them," said Harachi.

> Traditional Afro-Brazilian Capoiera battle dance was illustrated by the skilled Sal Corpuz.

The Pacific Islander's Club hosted the evening and gave an enthusiastic performance that engaged the entire audience. Thomas Wright, President of the Oregon Council on Multiracial Affairs was master of ceremonies for the event.
